Shankarnag theatre to reopen after 2 years

Bengaluru: Shankarnag Chitramandira, one of the iconic single-screen theatres on MG Road, is reopening after it was shut down two years ago. It has undergone a face-lift in decor and cinema technology and rechristened Swagath Onyx Theatre.

The theatre, owned by BBMP, has been leased out to the Swagath Group. Samsung has provided the digital screen, called Onyx Cinema LED, and the company's sister concern, Harman, provided sound technology. The Onyx Cinema LED, the first in the city, was launched globally by Samsung in 2017 and the first screen was installed in South Korea.

The theatre was named after the late Kannada actor-director Shankar Nag. It had shut down in 2005 and was later reopened by Fame Cinemas. In 2017, Fame decided not to renew its lease. Since then BBMP has been trying to find another exhibitor.

The Onyx Cinema LED screen installed in the refurbished theatre is the largest in the world. This mega screen – 14 metres long – has also been installed in two other locations – China and Malaysia. Samsunghas four Onyx screens in India — two in Delhi and one in Mumbai.

Samsung is literally changing the landscape of the central business district of Bengaluru. Besides the new screen, it opened the largest mobile experience centre in the world in Bengaluru's Opera House last year. Many single-screen theatres in the city have shut down due to lack of business. Earlier this year, Rex Theatre, a landmark on Brigade Road, downed shutters. A mall is expected to come up in its place.
